THERE BUT NOT THERE SILHOUETTE GRANTS FOR WW1 REMEMBRANCE

A national charity which supports soldiers and aims to commemorate 100 years since the end of World War 1 is hoping to encourage churches and other community organisations to host installations of seated silhouettes to remember those soldiers lost in battle.

The There But Not There campaign is an initiative from Remembered.

It is hoped the silhouettes will appear wherever there is a roll of honour, taking names off memorial walls and returning them to the spaces they left behind, putting them back into each community's psyche once again.

All money raised will be distributed evenly between The Royal Foundation's Armed Forces Programmes, Walking With The Wounded, Combat Stress, Help for Heroes, The Commonwealth

War Graves Foundation and Project Equinox: Housing Veterans.

Grants available

HARVESTING CREATIONTIDE

The season of Creationtide, from September 1 to October 4, focuses on our Christian responsibility to care for God's creation, both by giving thanks for God's good gifts and also by considering how we may care better for creation. The conference, which is a partnership between the Diocese of Truro, All Saints Church Highertown, Cornwall Quakers, Cornwall Refugee Resettlement Network, Turning the Tide and RJ Working, will feature a range of speakers.

The event is being hosted by All Saints Church Highertown and attendees are currently on an invite only basis although tickets are likely to become available to the general public nearer the time.

ALL SAFELY GATHERED IN? THE CHALLENGES FACING FARMERS

The weather has made this year an extremely challenging one for many farmers. How can we help those in our communities at a time when the harvest is coming in but the emotional, economical and practical pressures of achieving that have been a very high price to pay?

Revd Caspar Bush was a dairy farmer until five years ago when he sold his cows to become a clergyman. Today he is team rector of the five churches in and around Redruth and knows first-hand about the issues facing our farming communities. He said: "This year has created a powerful reminder of the vulnerability of many farmers' and growers' businesses. It's a stark reality that the two things which affect farming fortunes far more than anything else – the weather and the market – are things which farmers have absolutely no control over.

"Thank God, the farmers and growers who produce our food are usually very resilient and resourceful and most will find a way to struggle through this year. But the worries for all are very real and relentless, and some will be

facing severe financial difficulties and even insolvency."

Clergy working across our rural farming communities are urging people, especially as harvest time is upon us, to remember to ask people how things really are.

Caspar said: "Harvest festivals are a great time to check on any farmers you know, to pray for them, and encourage them in the work they do in good times and in bad."

INSPIRING PROJECT AIMED AT 'REMEMBERING GOD' FOR THOSE WITH NO CONFIDENCE IN GOING TO CHURCH

It's undeniable that across Cornwall we have a problem with missing generations in our churches. Not just the elusive 'youth' but whole other generations below and above the age of retirement. So, it's very tempting to think the older generation are okay – they have the type of church they want and are being very well served. But are they?

What if you felt housebound? What if you were living with dementia? Lonely, or lost the confidence to walk into a church. What if you felt the church you knew and loved was no longer accessible to you and everyone you knew has long since left?

God laid all of these questions on the heart of Barbara Bennett who decided it was time to act. Once a month Barbara organises, "Remembering God" at Stoke Climsland, part of the Callington Cluster. Led by Revd

Annabel King, it's a short service designed specifically with older people in mind who, for whatever reason, have lost their confidence in church.

Barbara was volunteering at their Church Café and realised, through talking to those who came along, that there were many barriers to people either coming back to church or trying it for the first time. "Some would say, 'Barbara, this café feels different,' and I would suggest, 'That's because God is here!' And then we would talk about what that meant. When I asked if they might like to come along to a church service, the answer would often be that they didn't feel they had a place there anymore, or couldn't physically get there at the appointed time, or it's not like it used to be."

CHANGES TO NATIONAL CHURCHES TRUST GRANT PROGRAMMES

The National Churches Trust has published details of its grants programme for 2019 to 2023.

Foundation Grants (£500 - £3,000), **Gateway Grants** (£3,000 - £10,000) and **Cornerstone Grants** (£10,000 - £50,000) are all being introduced.

Current grant programmes will come to an end on their next deadlines.

The Maintenance Grant Programme deadline is September 26, 2018. This will also be the last round of the Maintenance Programme under its current name.

CHURCH HOUSING TRUST CHANGES ITS NAME

Homelessness charity Church Housing Trust has changed its name to Church Homeless Trust.

Church Homeless Trust's new name emphasises its focus on homeless individuals and the specific support they need to rebuild their lives. There is no government funding for individual needs such as new ID, stipends for transport, or living costs if someone's Universal Credit has been delayed. Without these items it is impossible to live independently.

ST SITHNEY'S SKELETONS REVEALED BY WORKERS

Restoration at St Sithney revealed more of the church's past than they were expecting. As work began to rebuild the floor, the building contractors discovered human skeletons.

Perhaps not as significant as the discovery the skeleton of Richard III in a car park, these were people nevertheless, just as deserving of a high degree of dignity and respect.

A re-burial is planned and, as the remains were evidently originally entrusted to the care of St Sithney, that is where they will remain. As Revd Dr Peter Johnson said, "We want to respect those who previously worshipped and lived in the parish."



"Our builders were not surprised by the finding of a few bones to begin with but then got a shock when, the more they dug, the more full skeletons were discovered," said Shaun Rothwell of Rothwell Historical Restorations.
